History and what it means To Be a Knight

Late-19th century Connecticut was marked by the growing prevalence of fraternal benefit societies, hostility toward Catholic immigrants and dangerous working conditions in factories that left many families fatherless. Recognizing a vital, practical need in his community, Father Michael J. McGivney, gathered a group of men at his parish on Oct. 2, 1881. He proposed establishing a lay organization, the goal of which would be to unite men of Catholic faith and to provide for the families of deceased members.

As a symbol that allegiance to their country did not conflict with allegiance to their faith, the organization's members took as their patron Christopher Columbus — recognized as a Catholic and celebrated as the discoverer of America. Thanks to Father McGivney's persistence, Catholic men are drawn to the Knights because of its emphasis on

serving one's Church, community and family with virtue.

Edward L. Hearn wrote that a Knight should live according to the virtues of loyalty, charity, courtesy and modesty, as well as "selfdenial and careful respect for the feelings of others." Fraternity and patriotism were added to the Knights' founding principles of charity and unity in 1885 and 1900, respectively.

"One of the most popular and successful programs conducted by Knights of Columbus state and local councils for the benefit of people with intellectual disabilities is the fund-raiser in which councils collect donations outside stores and on street corners. In appreciation, the donor is offered a candy bar, often a

Tootsie Roll. The high visibility of this program has led to the campaign being referred to as the 'Tootsie Roll Drive.' The nickname is understandable, but misleading. The Knights of Columbus has no official tie to Tootsie Rolls or their manufacturer. In fact, many councils participate in the same fund-raising drive, but distribute other items.

References to this program should highlight the good the money does, not advertise a candy bar.

For these reasons, it is strongly recommended that this project be promoted as the 'Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities' rather than the 'Tootsie Roll Drive.' "

On August 18, the Knights of Columbus launched its new Long-Term Care Plus product. The new product is an enhancement and replacement of the Order's existing Long-Term Care insurance, where approved.

Originally introduced in 2000, Knights of Columbus longterm care insurance is designed to help Knights and their eligible family members pay for skilled and custodial care – whether at home or in an extended care facility. While life expectancies have been improving steadily, living longer may very well mean needing more care. Statistics show that nearly 70 percent of individuals over the age of 65 will require at least some type of long-term

care services during their lifetime. Yet most regular health insurance plans or government assistance programs do not provide sufficient coverage for longterm care needs

In the rosary, Mary leads us to her son

Praying the rosary is a simple and powerful way to stay strong in your faith. It invites us to invoke the patroness of our Order and to pray for one another in a spirit of charity, unity and fraternity. It allows for 15 to 20 minutes of quiet prayer to Christ. Depending on the day, the Joyful, Sorrowful, Glorious, or Luminous Mysteries are said. Use the guide below to refresh your commitment to grow in holiness.

- •Make the Sign of the Cross and say The Apostles' Creed while holding the cross of your Rosary beads.
- •Say the Our Father at the first single bead next to the cross.
- •Say three (3) Hail Marys, one at each of the following three beads.
- •Say the Glory Be to the Father at the following single

bead.

- •Announce the First Mystery at the chaplet that joins the ring of beads.
- •Say the Our Father at the first space following the chaplet.
- •Say ten (10) Hail Marys, one at each of the following beads, while meditating on the Mystery.

- •Say the Our Father at the next space, followed by 10 Hail Marys, a Glory Be to the Father, and the Fatima Prayer as in the previous Mystery.

•Say the Hail, Holy Queen at the chaplet concluding the circle of beads, and finish your prayer with the Sign of the Cross.

How to Conduct a Church Drive

It makes sense to look for new members in the place you're most likely to find them — your parish. One efficient and proven way to do this is to hold a recruitment drive at your parish. Here are three steps to success for your event.

- 1. The Preparation Phase
- Get permission from the pastor to hold the drive at all Masses on a set weekend.
- Advertise the drive in the parish bulletin.
- Organize your members for the drive weekend.

- Contact your council's field agent to get his assistance.
- Schedule a First Degree exemplification within one month of the recruitment drive
- 2. The Execution Phase
- Arrange for the membership recruitment announcement to be made during Mass
- Have members positioned at the entrances of the church to talk to prospects about joining and to help them complete a Membership

Document (#100)

- 3. The Follow-Up Phase
- Within 48 HOURS, council members must contact every prospect who completed a Membership Document (#100) or expressed interest in joining
- Inform prospects of the date, time and location of the open house and invite families to attend as well.

 Also, let them know the date, time and location of the First Degree exemplification.
